Program Committee Report

Dear Critical Care Assembly Member,

Program development for the May conference has been very fruitful. Niall and I are very grateful to our 25 committee members and the many assembly members who contributed their efforts and excellence to the final program. While the program—of course—includes the core foundations (e.g., sepsis, ARDS, mechanical ventilation), faculty have been particularly innovative. There's something for everyone: translational sessions (e.g., genomics, biologic interventions and VILI), clinically practical sessions (e.g., ICU extension/rescue, congestive heart failure, NIV) and even some philosophical sessions (e.g., ethics debates, philosophy of science). Here's a quick look at the program.

On Sunday morning, you can choose from a symposium on the ICU manpower crisis, a mini-symposium on genomics in critical care and a poster discussion on sepsis. Sunday afternoon will feature debates on ethics/end-of-life issues, a symposium that reviews practical approaches to NIV and a poster discussion on ICU structure and management.

On Monday morning, our symposium will highlight the increasing appreciation for the neuropsychiatric and physical sequelae of critical illness, and there will be a poster discussion on ARDS/ALI. The afternoon offers a symposium on (lung protective) mechanical ventilation of ALI/ARDS and a creative mini-symposium on translational science in VILI.

On Tuesday morning, our main track symposium is a highly creative session considering the application of clinical science in day-to-day practice. Dr. Alan Morris is the headliner who gave a similar—brilliant—keynote for the

Roger Bone Memorial lecture at ACCP several years ago. Morning poster discussions include innovations in mechanical ventilation, and identifying and managing patients at risk of critical illness. Tuesday afternoon is very busy with a symposium on identification and management of VAP and two mini-symposia, one on the future of biotherapies in critical illness and another presentation/discussion session of five clinical trials.

Wednesday is perhaps the busiest day for critical care clinicians and scientists (determined by luck of the draw when formulating the program). In the morning, the symposium is on congestive heart failure, and there are two mini-symposia—one on neuropsychiatric sequelae of critical illness and another on selected case reports (a new feature). The afternoon offers two symposia, one that was a favorite of the Program Committee on "Critical Care Around the World" and another on the increasing role of intensivists to rescue critically ill patients on hospital wards and in emergency departments. Poster discussions on ethics/end-of-life care and neurologic complications of critical illness round out the afternoon.

In response to comments at last year's Assembly meeting, speaking and chairmanship duties have been delegated more broadly. Both senior and junior faculty from many countries are speaking, chairing and facilitating. Thematic poster sessions will (whenever possible) be facilitated by "dyads" of a senior and junior faculty member who will review eight to 10 posters that have been arranged topically and geographically. This will allow dyads who so choose to invite first authors to join in a larger group that moves from poster to poster (a model lauded at last year's conference).

We look forward to seeing you in New Orleans and hope you'll stay through Wednesday to attend some of the highlights of the program.

Website Report

The last year has been a busy one for the Critical Care Website as www.thoracic.org has been revamped.

In the fall of 2009, in anticipation of H1N1 influenza, we posted expert reviews describing salvage therapies for ARDS. The articles review methods such as prone positioning, recruitment maneuvers, alternative modes of ventilation, inhaled vasodilators, and ECMO.

Our Critical Care Clinical Cases Section provide peer-reviewed pediatric and adult critical care cases framed by multiple choice questions and detailed discussions. Some recent cases describe a neonate with respiratory distress, a man with massive hemoptysis, and a patient who developed septic shock after a colectomy.

The Critical Care Journal Club critiqued original articles published in the areas of acute respiratory failure, mechanical ventilation, translational science, surgical and pediatric critical care. We have also utilized the Critical Care Forum to host a live chat journal club between Critical Care assembly members and Dr. Fredric Adnet, the senior author of the *Lancet* study comparing etomidate to ketamine for rapid sequence intubation.

The forum also serves as a means by which assembly members can discuss relevant critical care issues. In 2009, we started a specific forum for members to post their clinical experiences treating H1N1. We encourage members to utilize the forum to provide us with feedback about the content on the website.

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Patients to Speak At Thirteen Designated ATS International Conference Symposia

The ATS Public Advisory Roundtable (ATS PAR) has selected patients to provide a patient perspective at thirteen symposia at the 2010 ATS International Conference Symposia. This concept has worked exceptionally well within the format of the PAR Symposium for the last seven years as well as at an increasing number of sessions at ATS International Conferences from 2004 to 2009.

This is the seventh year that patient speakers will participate within the Assemblies' Symposia. The patients will make a five-minute presentation to offer insight into their personal journeys. This insight will address diagnosis, treatment, and how the disease has dramatically altered their lifestyle, family, career and relationships. They will share their perspective into what patients would like physicians and researchers to know about physician/patient relationships and the importance and relevance of the work in which investigators and researchers are engaged.
