SUPPLEMENTAL OXYGEN THERAPY WORKING GROUP

Dr. Deena Costa, University of Michigan is busy reviewing responses to questions for our next podcast, *Bringing a nurse* perspective to clinical effectiveness research. Be sure to catch this podcast!

The Oxygen Working Group will be meeting during the upcoming ATS International Conference on Sunday, May 19th from 11:45 a.m -12:15 p.m at the Hyatt Regency, Dallas in the Cumberland F room (Exhibition level). Anyone who is attending ATS is welcome to join us. The four areas of focus for this group are clinician education, patient education, research, and advocacy/government policy. This multidisciplinary group represents stakeholders with the common goal of improving education and access around adequate oxygen services.

There are two oxygen-specific sessions during upcoming international conference. The first is a symposium titled, "Rethinking Oxygen: Getting the Right Oxygen to the Right Patient", co-chaired by Susan Jacobs and Kathy Lindell. The second offering is a Meet the Professor with Michelle Cao addressing, "Navigating the Challenges of Home Oxygen Therapy for Complex Sleep Related Respiratory Disorders and Respiratory Failure Syndromes".

This past year has been highlighted by many workgroup members' activities on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C. to address potential problems with the institution of a 'pause' in the competitive bidding program by the Center for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). Our policy efforts will be reviewed at our Working Group meeting in May at the international conference. In addition, at our May meeting we will review a plan for patients to contact their local senators and representatives about oxygen problems in person, at town hall meetings, or by letter. The feedback from our Capitol Hill advocates is very clear; if senators and representatives have not heard from their constituents in regards to oxygen problems, they cannot support lobbying efforts to improve oxygen services. Based on our discussions during the May international conference, the Oxygen Working Group will plan oxygen-related programming for the ATS 2020 international conference, as well as other priorities for oxygen-related research and education.

The Assembly on Nursing of the American Thoracic Society (ATS) and the International Nursing Research Priorities: CARES: [Critical care, Adult Respiratory Health, and Sleep] Committee has been busy this past year completing Round 2 of a conventional consensus-building Delphi survey to determine areas of focus for nursing research in relation to pulmonary, critical care and sleep issues. The overall goal of this project is to update and internationalize nursing research priorities for the ATS, using experts in nursing research, nurses who work internationally, patients, their families and their caregivers. The Committee plans to have a writing day during the upcoming international conference in Dallas, with a target submission of the Annals of the ATS journal in June this year. Additional information: The field of clinical practice guideline development has changed dramatically over the past decade. Formal standards must now be met as defined by the Institute of Medicine, which include a specific approach to searching for evidence, selecting evidence, summarized evidence, formulating recommendations, and rating the quality of evidence and the strength of the recommendations. The ATS and other guideline developers have learned that to successfully adhere to these standards, a guideline methodologist is necessary on each guideline committee. Clinical practice guideline methodologists are individuals who are capable of leading both systematic reviews (i.e., develop search strategies, select studies, extract data, perform meta-analyses, and construct evidence tables and summary of findings tables) and the formulation and grading of evidence-based recommendations.

The requirement that there be a methodologist on every guideline committee has created an imbalance, with the demand for methodologists far exceeding the supply. As organizations move toward continuously updating guidelines and demand increases, this imbalance will worsen. In order to combat this trend and build methodological capacity, the ATS has a methodology training program that takes individuals who have an interest in learning guideline methodology and places them on a guideline panel that needs methodological support. The trainee does the hands-on methodological work for the panel with guidance from the ATS methodologist and, in return, gains experience and middle co-authorship on the guideline. After working on one or two such guidelines projects, the trainee will likely have the skills necessary to become an independent methodologist. We believe that this is a potential career pathway, particularly well-suited for clinician-educators.

Additional benefits of the program include: a) systematic reviews performed during the development of the guideline are often publishable as independent entities and the trainee would be the first author on such derivatives, b) participation in a methodology training workshop, and c) participation in the Evidence Synthesis Methodology Working Group of the Behavioral Sciences and Health Services Research Assembly. The latter will lead to additional opportunities to participate in various workshops and projects.
