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MESSAGE FROM THE ASSEMBLY CHAIR

Dear Assembly Colleagues,

The past year has been incredibly productive for the Pediatric Assembly! It has been an honor to serve as the Assembly Chair. I would like to thank the Executive Committee members for their hard work and dedication this year. I would also like to especially thank Jim Chmiel, the previous Assembly Chair, for providing guidance this past year as I transitioned into this role.

We have an exciting program planned for the ATS International Conference in San Diego! Paul

Moore, Program Chair, Sharon Dell, Program Chair-Elect, and the committee members have developed a dynamic program for the 2018 conference. Highlights include Pediatric Year in Review, six symposia, the historically well attended early morning MOC sessions, 4 postgraduate courses and 4 mini-symposia. 350 abstracts from all over the world were submitted to the Pediatric Assembly this year. I would also like to thank Edith Zemanick and Deborah Liptzin for organizing the pediatric course curriculum for the resident bootcamp. The bootcamp is highly regarded by the trainees; residents that have matched in pediatric intensive care or pediatric pulmonology may attend this bootcamp. However, new this year, first and second year residents who have not matched, but are interested in subspecializing in pediatric pulmonary or pediatric intensive care may apply to attend the International conference through the Pediatric Resident Development Scholarship. Each Scholarship awardee will receive a certificate of achievement, a travel stipend in the amount of \$1000 and one year's Trainee Membership to the ATS. Jim Chmiel is once again directing the popular pediatric pillar for the fellows track symposium. Please encourage your fellows to apply.

I would like to thank Hara Levy for her work this year as Planning Chair. Seven projects were renewed this year; pediatrics serves as the primary assembly for four of these projects. If you have ideas for a project, it is not too early to begin planning. The application deadline for new projects typically occurs in July. If you have any questions about a project, please reach out to Hara Levy. The planning committee is also reviewing nominations for the pediatric assembly awards. As you recall, we have four awards: the Founders Award, the Lifetime Contributions to Pediatric Respiratory Medicine Award, the Robert B. Mellins Award, and the Pediatric Clinician Educator Award. The ninth annual Founders award will be presented to a "giant" in the field of pediatric pulmonology, critical care or neonatal medicine. The second annual Lifetime Contributions to Pediatric Respiratory Medicine award will be presented to a candidate who has dedicated his or her career to advancement in pediatric pulmonary medicine. The Pediatric Clinician Educator Award is presented to an Assistant or Associate Professor level candidate who is an innovative and an exemplary clinician and teacher. The Robert Mellins Award is presented to the Instructor, Assistant or early Associate Professor level candidate who is recognized for his or her achievements in scholarship or research. Partnering with the Sleep Assembly, we have added a new award this year honoring Carole L. Marcus. This outstanding achievement award will be presented to a junior faculty member for his or her career accomplishments in the area of pediatric sleep and respiratory neurobiology.

This year, we once again have the Founders Dinner scheduled where we honor our mentors in pediatric respiratory medicine as well as emerging leaders. This year, the Pediatric Assembly business meeting and the Founders Dinner are occurring on the same evening, Sunday May 20th. I would like to thank Peter Mogayzel, our Nominating Chair, and his committee at putting the slate of future officers together. Election results will be announced at the Pediatric Assembly Business meeting. Pediatric Assembly awards will be presented at the Founders dinner, scheduled on Sunday evening, May 20th. Please register for the dinner, it is certainly a highlight of the meeting!

The interest groups, working groups and subcommittees of the Scientific Assembly on Pediatrics have been quite active since we met as an Assembly in May 2017. The Pediatric Assembly Interest Groups are Infant and Preschool Lung Function led by Jessica Pittman and the Neonatal and Developing Lung Group led by Henry Rozycki and Lawrence Nogee. Transition of Care is a joint working group led by Greg Sawicki and Carla Frederick of Clinical Problems; a joint symposium led by this group will be presented at the International Conference. The International Relations Working Group led by Laura Gochicoa and Ozge Yilmaz continues to expand. This group highlights their work through the Virtual International Pediatric Pulmonary Network (VIPPN) webpage. This working group has also planned a program on Saturday May 19th at the ATS exploring the international challenges and barriers to pediatric respiratory research. The International Relations Working Group will officially become a subcommittee of the Scientific Assembly on Pediatrics this year. The previous Sickle Cell Working Group led by Anastassios Koumbourlis presented their work at the annual Sickle Cell Conference. The newly established Long-Range Vision Sub-Committee has been active this year, speaking quarterly through conference calls. This group provides institutional memory for the Assembly and provides strategic advice for both the Assembly Chair and the Executive Committee.

The Early Career Professionals Working Group led by DB Sanders continues to expand. A recent email was sent from the ATS requesting members to sign up as a mentor or mentee. This program is quite successful at pairing mentors with mentees; thereby, providing professional guidance to emerging leaders in our field. The Apprenticeship Program went very well this year. This program offered the opportunity for one young faculty member to serve on either the Pediatric Program or Planning committees. The Pediatric Assembly is announcing a new networking opportunity for young faculty, sponsored through the Early Career Professionals Working Group. A luncheon is planned for young faculty to attend on Sunday, May 20th during the conference. During the luncheon, faculty will have the opportunity to participate in smaller groups that will each have a senior advisor. Thank you to DB Sanders, Kristie Ross and Chris Baker for leading this effort. Please plan to attend!

Ben Kopp has been an amazing Web Director for the Assembly for the past 2 years. He and his team work behind the scenes on journal clubs, twitter, Podcasts, and Quick Hits cases. The twitter account is new this year and has definitely improved communication within the Pediatric Assembly. I would like to thank Ben Kopp for his outstanding leadership!

The ATS Pediatric Division Chiefs group, led by Tom Lahiri and Christopher Oermann, has been busy! This group is working with the Adult Division Chiefs group to put together a Saturday forum for leaders, a mentoring program for young Division Chiefs and a business meeting is scheduled for Sunday May 20th All Division Chiefs and Clinical Directors are invited!

PROGRAM COMMITTEE REPORT Paul Moore, MD, Chair and Sharon D. M. Dell, MD, Chair-Elect

The 2018 International Conference in San Diego offers a wide range of programming across the many disciplines and interests of the Pediatric Assembly. Thank you to the members of the Assembly who submitted such outstanding proposals for symposia, workshops, and postgraduate courses, in addition to an excellent number of scientific abstracts and case reports. Thanks also to the members of the Program Committee who reviewed these submissions in such a timely fashion.

The full program is outlined below, and there are a number of areas worth highlighting:

Postgraduate Courses. For the first time, 4 post-graduate courses submitted by members of the Pediatric Assembly will be offered and feature clinical and research updates on Aerodigestive Diseases, Severe Asthma, Pulmonary Genetics, and Respiratory Physiology.

Core Curriculum. Rise and shine in San Diego each morning at 7 AM for the Pediatric Core Curriculum. Topics in 2018 include updates in Cystic Fibrosis, Neuromuscular Diseases, Aerodigestive Diseases, and Respiratory Physiology.

Scientific Symposia. A total of 6 scientific symposia feature these diverse topics:

- Accelerating Scientific Advancement of Rare Pediatric Lung Diseases
- Genetic, Genomics, and Epigenetics of Childhood Lung Diseases
- Just Do It: Reducing Pediatric Respiratory Health Disparities
- Future Respiratory Health in Children: Climate Change and Increasing World Population
- Controversies in Clinical Pediatric Pulmonology
- Growing Up with Chronic Pulmonary Disease: Challenges in the Transition from Pediatric to Adult Focused Health Care

Pediatric Year in Review. This popular session is on Sunday afternoon and will focus on updates in Severe Asthma, Neuromuscular Diseases, the Respiratory Microbiome, and Innate Immunity.

Pediatric Clinical Chest Rounds. Another highly popular session, programmed on Tuesday afternoon, features trainees presenting 4 fascinating cases and review by expert faculty discussants.

Workshops, Sunrise Seminars, and Meet the Professor Sessions feature a number of experts within the Assembly who share their expertise.

Mini Symposia. These sessions highlight a handful of abstracts submitted to the Pediatric Assembly:

- Best of Pediatrics
- Advances in Pediatric Sleep Medicine in honor of Carole Marcus, a leader in Pediatric Sleep who passed away unexpectedly in November 2017
- Importance of Longitudinal Cohort Studies in Pediatrics, featuring updates on primary ciliary dyskinesia, childhood interstitial lung disease, and asthma
- Mechanisms of Bronchopulmonary Dysplasia

Poster Discussion Sessions. All 6 Poster Discussion sessions in the Pediatric Assembly will utilize RAPiD (Rapid Abstract Poster Discussion), in which each author will be given 1 minute to present a single slide at the start of the session. The authors will be present at their posters for the next hour, followed by a discussion of relevant themes and issues the final 30 minutes.

Thematic Poster Sessions. Remember to stop by the posters during the unopposed time mid-day each day to support your colleagues, including many of our trainees!

We hope that you enjoy the 2018 International Conference, and please keep in mind that proposals for the 2019 International Conference will be due in June. See you in San Diego.

PLANNING COMMITTEE REPORT Hara Levy, MD, MMSc, Chair

It has been a wonderful and exciting year with lots accomplished and lots to still do. I was honored to ask to serve in this role and hope that I was able to continue the great work that Don Hayes had started previously. This year alone, six new project applications with pediatrics as the primary or secondary assembly were submitted for review and six renewal applications approved for funding.

- Clinical Practice Guidelines for Long Term Oxygen Therapy in Children (Chairs: Don Hayes and Robin Deterding)
- International ERS/ATS guidelines on definition, evaluation and treatment of severe asthma (Chair: Fernando Holguin)

The Planning Committee works closely with the Pediatric Assembly members to achieve ATS support for both new and ongoing projects. The Planning Committee encourages project proposal submissions to the committee for consideration in advance of submission to the ATS. New project proposals are currently being solicited. All projects will undergo peer-review by the Pediatric Assembly Planning Committee and Program Review Subcommittee.

The Web Committee would like to thank the PEDS assembly for their support and efforts in helping our web-based content and communication strategy continue to grow. 2017 marked the start of our initiative to join the growing medical social media field through our new Twitter account. Twitter is quick and easy, and a perfect way to interact and share relevant PEDS information in our time-starved lives. Look for continued expansion of our social media efforts in the coming years.

This year VIPPN is activated with more content; monthly changing "editorial picks of interesting articles". Moreover, members of the editorial board of the website is introduced every two months to allow collaboration and communication. Loyal to its tagline, the American Thoracic Society helps the world breathe; the ATS has been working to build research capacity in low- and middle-income countries through its Methods in Epidemiologic, Clinical, and Operations Research (MECOR) program for 25 years. This intensive course for physicians and related health care professionals increases capacity and leadership in pulmonary, critical care, and sleep medicine research beyond its US borders and US membership.

This spring, the ATS launched MECOR 2.0, which includes a ground-up redesign of the curriculum, course organization, and faculty/ mentorship offerings. The updated program capitalizes and builds upon the program's extensive experience and expertise. The curriculum utilizes a "flipped classroom" teaching model with seminar style classroom sessions and a focus on one to one instruction with a learning management system for students, faculty, and alumni (CANVAS).

Since its initiation in 1994, the scope of the ATS MECOR program has grown tremendously. Today, its footprint is truly global with more than 1800 graduates from its global network of courses. Courses and partners include in *Africa*, the Pan African Thoracic, in *China*, the Chinese Thoracic Society, in *India*, the US Centers for Disease Control and the Indian Council for Medical Research, in *Indonesia*, the Indonesian Society for Respirology, in the *Mediterranean*, the Turkish Thoracic Society, in *Latin American* the Latin American Thoracic Society, and in *Southeast Asia*, the Vietnamese National TB Program and the University of Sydney.

Help Available for Assembly Members on Clinical and Research Ethics and Conflict Management

The ATS Ethics and Conflict of Interest Committee is a society-wide committee appointed by the ATS President to be a resource and contribute to ATS education on biomedical and organizational ethics. Its seventeen members are from many ATS assemblies and sections, and many have leadership roles in their institution's ethics committees, advanced degrees in medical or nursing ethics, and have published on related issues.

Assembly members are encouraged to use the committee for advice and help in developing programs, statements, and conference sessions relevant to clinical or research ethics or managing conflicts of interest (COI), as well as in dealing with the ethical issues you face in the workplace. In recent years, the committee developed ATS statements on Managing Conscientious Objections and Responding to Requests for Potentially Inappropriate Therapies, and produced pod-casts on other topics that are available within the ATS Breathe Easy podcasts on the ATS website. It also oversees ATS management of COI. The Committee is chaired by David Chooljian, MD, JD.
