Meet with your colleagues and brainstorm about sessions that you would like to see or people you would like to hear next year. The proposals are usually due around the time that you start to recover from this year's meeting! We also have a dearth of new projects in queue for the Planning Committee, so please be thinking about new guideline statements, documents, workshops, conferences or other novel products.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE REPORT Mark Metersky, MD, Chair and Rachel Thomson, MBBS, PhD, FRACP, Chair-Elect

Our main objectives have been to provide a comprehensive range of scientific research, clinical information and updates to the PI-TB programming for the ATS 2018 International Conference. We endeavored to not only find a balance of topics that reflected the Assembly's interests but also strived to find content that would have universal interest and appeal. We are indebted to the many individuals and groups who collaborated to propose very strong symposia, courses, and seminars. There was very strong participation in proposals for scientific symposia and other

venues this year. The Program Committee and other ATS committees voted on these proposals and on submitted abstract to establish the content for this year's meeting.

We are deeply appreciative of the efforts of the Program Committee in reviewing the scientific and clinical submissions over the course of the year. We look forward to the International Conference providing stimulating and thought-provoking research and clinical information. The Program Committee met at the 2017 ATS International Conference, and then conducted its work on line and through email and phone conversations. An advisory committee serves to provide input regarding programming. There were two ATS-wide International Conference Committee (ICC) planning meetings, in September and December of 2017, where Mark Metersky, Chair of the Program Committee, and Rachel Thomson, Chair-Elect, represented PI-TB. During the September meeting, the main task was to schedule the Assembly Scientific Symposia. In addition, the Joint Assembly Scientific Symposia were voted upon and scheduled. During the December ICC meeting we programmed more than 450 submitted abstracts into symposia and poster sessions that we hope will advance the scientific and clinical activities of the Assembly membership. The submitted abstracts were grouped according to Program Committee score and content. We have endeavored to diversify the moderators and facilitators for sessions. We also have sought to pair junior facilitators and moderators with senior faculty at poster sessions.

With regard to scheduling, the number of slots and presentation venues are set by ATS. All Assemblies are assigned a certain number of "Wednesday slots," i.e. they are required by ATS in order to be equitable. Keynotes, Year in Review, Workshops and Post-graduate courses are chosen by non-PI-TB ATS committees. However, this year, in response to a perceived paucity of "Year in Review" content related to pulmonary infection, we successfully lobbied for additional infection-related content.

We would like to acknowledge and thank each of the Program Committee members for their service, hard work in reviewing and scoring abstracts and , as well as for their input into the programming during the past year. The Committee Members for 2017-2018 are:

WEB COMMITTEE REPORT Ritwij Kulkarni, MSc, PhD, Chair

The main objectives of PI-TB web committee are to facilitate communication between various assembly stake-holders by providing various avenues of access and to disseminate scientific information through official statements, links to news articles, webinars, journal clubs and podcasts. The web committee has organized many webinars and online journal clubs to highlight important discoveries in the field of pulmonary infection since 2013. We have also started posting podcasts since 2017. The webinars, journal clubs and podcasts have been instrumental in increasing member engagement. In the future, we will continue with these activities, while expanding our digital presence via twitter. In addition, we will begin publishing "Pulmo-pedia", an educational service for clinicians to get simple, clear answers to questions raised in the evaluation and management of patients with pulmonary infections, including tuberculosis (TB).

The PI-TB website features links to our many highly cited statements and positions papers, as well as links to infectionrelated organizations around the globe. The website also provides assembly-specific data, including leader-ship contacts and assembly news. In particular, look for upcoming information regarding the ATS 2018 PI-TB Symposia and ongoing updates about the many important projects the PI-TB Assembly supports.

In addition to the static content posted to the website, the PI-TB's efforts to provide important information related to the pathogenesis, host response, diagnosis, and management of respiratory tract infection now include live, interactive webinar and journal club series addressing novel, controversial, and timely issues. These series include live presentations by international experts followed by interactive question and answer sessions from ATS members from all Assemblies. It is noteworthy that our webinars and journal clubs are attended by international audience spanning across time zones. EARLY CAREER PROFESSIONALS WORKING GROUP REPORT Bashar Staitieh, MD, Chair and Laura Gleeson, MB, BCh, Co-Chair

Greetings from the PI-TB Early Career Working Group! Our working group was established by the executive committee several years ago with the primary goal of increasing assembly recruitment, retention, and engagement among junior ATS members. In the past year, the ECWG has focused its efforts on recruitment of and communication with new members, networking between junior and senior members, and offering career development opportunities within the assembly.

Recruitment and Communication:

- We developed an orientation session for the International Conference this past year that ran at the start of the assembly business meeting to orient new members to the assembly structure and give them an opportunity to interact with assembly leadership. The session will run again this year at 4PM on the day of the assembly business meeting.
- The orientation session was complimented by an overhauled sign-up sheet that offered new members a menu of options for participating in assembly activities (detailed below).
- A mini-newsletter focused on junior members detailing PI-TB assembly activities and opportunities for engagement was distributed in 2017 and another is going out in Spring of 2018.

Networking between junior and senior members:

- The ECWG continued the mentorship program at the 2017 International Conference and we're in the process of organizing the program for the 2018 conference. This year, we're putting additional emphasis on Junior Faculty and Senior Fellows serving as mentors for more junior members (such as residents and medical students).
- The successful Journal Club also continued during the year with topics including HIV-associated Lung Disease and Pneumonia in the Elderly, and a more recent session on Host Defense and Mucosal Immunity.

Career Development Opportunities:

- The ECWG developed two instructional guides, one for podcast interviews with senior mentors and one for article summaries for the assembly website. The guides were sent to new members who indicated an interest in assembly activities on their sign-up sheets.
- The ECWG facilitated the assembly's participation in the Rising Stars program through the Science and Innovation Center at the 2017 International Conference, with both the past co-chair and current chair presenting to an audience drawn from the science-leaning assemblies.
- The contacts and networking provided by the ECWG continue to help junior members join other assembly committees (particularly the Web and Program Committees)

The curriculum utilizes a "flipped classroom" teaching model with seminar style classroom sessions and a focus on one to one instruction with a learning management system for students, faculty, and alumni (CANVAS).

Since its initiation in 1994, the scope of the ATS MECOR program has grown tremendously. Today, its footprint is truly global with more than 1800 graduates from its global network of courses. The ATS Ethics and Conflict of Interest Committee is a society-wide committee appointed by the ATS President to be a resource and contribute to ATS education on biomedical and organizational ethics.
