EOH Program Committee has been busy working to achieve a stimulating program for EOH and other members at the ATS 2012 International Conference in San Francisco. We received excellent proposals and altogether 366 abstracts and 21 late breaking abstracts (some of them jointly with other assemblies) from the members and would like to thank you for your activity, which enabled us to form interesting sessions.

The EOH Assembly is responsible for two exciting post-graduate courses: PG 7 Epigenetics of lung diseases, will give insight into this new area studying environmental influences in the origins and mechanisms of lung diseases that are likely to revolutionize our thinking; PG19 Novel approaches to investigate occupational and environmental causes in common lung diseases, will provide clinical perspective on the role of these factors in the development of the most common lung diseases, reminding us of their importance beyond specific occupational disease diagnoses. I warmly recommend that you register for these courses. There will also be Meet the Professor and Sunrise Seminars given by recognized experts.

The scientific sessions will complement the postgraduate courses and provide a view of latest developments in a wide range of topics, such as Work-exacerbated asthma; Epigenetics at the crossroads; Idiopathic interstitial pneumonias/pulmonary fibrosis: Is idiopathic truly idiopathic?; and Inhaled exposures, genetics and airways disease: A

view towards prevention. We are also co-sponsoring a number of sessions arranged by other assemblies that have data relevant for our members.

The EOH Assembly will have four Mini-Symposia on a variety of topics, including How bad is traffic pollution? Health effects and interventions; Hygiene hypothesis revisited; Predictors for COPD progression and outcomes; and How do dietary factors and obesity influence lung disease? In addition there will be five Poster Discussion sessions and 11 Thematic Poster Sessions, so the program will offer lots of new data and novel ideas and will provide a platform for fruitful discussions and interactions.

A key function of the Planning Committee's is to help develop ATS EOH Assembly Statements and Position Papers, which typically ensue from ATS-funded Assembly projects. A major new statement published in 2011 was An Official American Thoracic Society Statement: Work-Exacerbated Asthma. http://www.thoracic.org/ statements/resources/eoh/an-official-ats-statement-work-exacerbated-asthma.pdf This statement documents that work-exacerbated asthma (WEA) is a common and under-recognized adverse outcome resulting from conditions at work. The statement calls for additional research to improve the understanding of the risk factors for, and mechanisms and outcomes of, WEA, and to inform and evaluate preventive interventions.

The EOH Assembly has 3 continuing, renewed projects:

Proceedings of the 4th Jack Pepys Workshop Document (Project Co-Chairs Susan M Tarlo and Jean-Luc Malo). The 4th Jack Pepys Workshop on Work-related Airways Disease was held in Toronto in May 2010 with about 60 international invited participants as well as trainees and allied health professionals with interest in the area. The scope included both asthma as well as discussion of other occupational airway diseases, in particular occupationally-related COPD and bronchiolitis. Clinical and public health aspects of disease were explored for: 1) outcomes after diagnosis; 2) the working environment, 3) disease surveillance; and 4) prevention activities at individual and population levels. A Workshop Proceedings document has been prepared by the co-chairs

with assistance from several of the presenters, and it has been submitted for review Feb 2012 to the ATS documents website for consideration for publication in PATS. The project was re-approved by ATS in 2012 with a budget for publication costs.

- Spirometry in the Occupational Setting (Project Co-Chairs Susan Tarlo and Carrie Redlich). This project has received approval for renewal in 2012 and is nearing a final draft document. The panel members have included Mary Townsend, David Weissman, John Hankinson, Bill Eschenbacher, Susanna von Essen, Martin Miller, Holger Schunemann, Torben Sigsgaard and Robert Crapo. A formal literature search has been conducted with the aid of a medical librarian, addressing questions identified by the panel that are not addressed in other guidelines on spirometry in general. These were a) is there a difference in test performance and safety with the subject standing versus sitting?, b) what reference values or correction should be used for workers in N America of Asian background?, c) what training/retraining requirements are necessary for spirometry in the occupational setting?, and d) what are the longitudinal changes in spirometry that should lead to other action from this setting?
- Updating the 1996 ATS Statement: Respiratory Protection Guidelines (Project Chair David Weissman). ATS issued guidelines on respiratory protection in 1996. The current project is necessary because, since then, much has changed. Regulations cited in the statement are now obsolete. Respiratory protection terminology and practices have changed. A new class of FDA-approved respirators for use in public emergencies, such as pandemic influenza, has been developed. This project will update the statement.

Prior to the ATS Annual Conference in May, the Planning Committee will be considering nominations for several Assembly Awards. http://www.thoracic.org/assemblies/eoh/awards/index.php These include the John M. Peters Award for outstanding contributions to environmental or occupational health through leadership in research, education, or public health and the Val Vallyathan Senior Faculty Award for applicants with outstanding contributions to basic and translational science in environmental or occupational respiratory diseases. Nominations for the Val Vallyathan Senior Faculty Award close on Feb 15th, 2012 and for the John M. Peters award on March 1st, 2012.

We are fortunate that Dr. Vinicius Antao has accepted a 2-year term as the new Chair, beginning with the 2012 Annual Conference. The EOH Planning Committee will also be turning over some of its membership in the coming year. ATS PAR Symposium

During ATS 2012, the Society's Public Advisory Roundtable will once again bring together clinicians, researchers and patients at its annual symposium on Monday, May 21, from 2 to 4:30 p.m.

This year, the program will focus on nontuberculous mycobacterial (NTM) diseases. A host of experts will discuss various research agendas, all of which are designed to identify a cure to control and reduce the burden of these environmental disorders.

"Faculty members will first talk more generally about what is needed for a disease or condition to progress toward a cure or control using mycobacterial diseases as an example," said Teresa Barnes, chair of ATS PAR and vice president of patient outreach and advocacy at the Coalition for Pulmonary Fibrosis, who will co-chair the symposium with ATS Immediate-Past President Dean E. Schraufnagel, MD. "Then, presenters will highlight the areas of research that are most likely to produce breakthroughs in environmental mycobacterial diseases and focus on research and its application to these disorders."

The event will begin with Ms. Barnes giving out ATS PAR's 2012 awards, which honor individuals who are committed to advancing research and clinical care in the fields of pulmonary, critical care and sleep medicine. Next, Dr. Schraufnagel will introduce a patient speaker who will talk about NTM disease from the patient and family perspectives. Other faculty members will then focus on the importance of removing bacteria from the environment, the role of molecular methods in diagnosis and testing effective treatments.
