Message From the Program Chair Richard Schwab, MD

It has been my honor to serve as the program chair (2007) and chair elect (2006) for the RNS assembly the last two years. I have received a great deal of help from many of the RNS assembly, including all of the members of the Program Committee, roughly 50% of which includes international members. Through the help of our international colleagues, we have continued to solicit abstracts from around the world yielding a substantial increase in number of abstracts from prior years. The quality of our abstracts remains outstanding.

There is a wide range of excellent sleep topics on the program at this year's ATS meeting in San Francisco. We have put together an outstanding lineup of speakers covering a range of topics from basic neurobiology, to important clinical updates and patient oriented research. For the first time we have two postgraduate sleep courses. We have included a number of RNS speakers in sessions that were programmed by other assemblies. In addition to our three primary sleep symposia (vascular homeostasis, upper airway imaging, multi-center international clinical trials in sleep apnea) we have symposia programmed through Pediatrics (pathophysiology of OSA) and Critical Care (sleep and mechanical ventilation). We were also were able to program 4 hybrid symposia which have at least one sleep talk. The featured speakers for the mini-symposia are outstanding as are the program chairman for the poster discussion sessions. Many of you volunteered to be facilitators for the thematic poster sessions. Thus, we anticipate something for everyone at this upcoming international conference in San Francisco.

Finally, I am leaving this committee in the capable hands of Geraldo Lorenzi Filho, M.D. (geraldo.lorenzi@incor.usp.br), who will be taking over for me as Program Chair at the May 2007 meeting. Please let us know if you have ideas for future symposia or ways to improve the ATS sessions. This year, we have succeeded in obtaining funding for a number of awards to be provided to the best abstracts, travel awards (including some designated for the minorities and those under-represented), the Young Investigator Award and other prizes for young investigators. Thus, I encourage you all to attend the ATS 2007 meeting, so we can all learn from one another and help to support the new generation of clinicians and investigators. See you in San Francisco!!

The major initiative related to the website this year was the introduction of the monthly Sleep Fragment Quiz. This feature has been designed to test knowledge of sleep study tracings and members' expertise in sleep medicine. The interactive feature includes a sleep study fragment with question(s) followed by an annotated fragement and answer(s). Fragments may illustrate abnormal events or artifacts. Even-

tually, we also hope to include hypnograms and sleep logs. Members of the assembly planning committee are contributing fragments each month. If you have an interesting fragment that should be posted, please contact James A. Rowley, MD for more information.

In addition, Drs. Schlenker and Rowley have continued the Journal Watch, a three times per year feature in which both basic science and clinically relevant articles from journals infrequently read by the assembly membership are reviewed.



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Please Consider Submitting an Assembly/Committee Project Application for Funding in FY2008

For your information, the FY2008 (January 1-December 31, 2008) project application forms for Assembly/Committee projects will be available on the ATS website (www.thoracic.org) on May 1, 2007. There will be a link to the project submission forms on the ATS homepage.

Please consider submitting an application for an Assembly/Committee project. If you have an idea for a project application and you need assistance, please contact your Assembly Planning Committee chair Richard Schwab at rschwab@mail.med.upenn.edu.

The timeline for the application and review process follows:

- ◆ May 2007: FY2008 forms are available
- July 23, 2007: Assembly/ Committee project applications are due to the ATS office. Late submissions will not be accepted.
- ◆ Early-mid August 2007: abridged versions of the proposals will be

posted on the ATS site and emails will be sent to ATS Leadership, Assembly Planning Committee Chairs, Assembly Chairs, ATS Committee Chairs, appropriate ATS staff and the PRS committee, to notify them that the current, un-reviewed proposals are available. This will give everyone an opportunity to touch base with any of the applicants if they would like to get involved with a project before it goes to the PRS for review.

- ♦ August 1-17, 2007: Assembly Planning Committees will meet via conference call to review appropriate proposals. Any proposal that has indicated on the form that a specific ATS committee may want to become involved will be sent to the ATS committee chair and to the appropriate staff member. Committees are encouraged to work with appropriate ATS staff and review any proposals and to send recommendations to the applicant and to the PRS.
- September 4, 2007: Revised proposals and all reviews from As-

- semblies and Committees are due to ATS office. This includes any proposal that has revisions based on a review by an Assembly Planning Committee or an ATS Committee.
- ◆ Early October 2007: Program Review Sub-Committee (PRS) meeting.
- ◆ Early November 2007: Program & Budget Committee (P&B) meeting. Recommendations from the PRS will be provided to the P&B Committee. At the discretion of the P&B Committee, specific projects will be added to the FY2007 budget as new items.
- ◆ December 2007: ATS Board reviews FY 2008 Budget
